# Rose State College Political Science (0124) Program Review 2017

## Description of the program's connection to the institutional mission and goals:

Political Science is one of the most relevant and popular areas of study for college students. Since the beginning of the 21<sup>st</sup> century, we have witnessed life-altering events that shape the lives of students: the 9/11 attacks, wars in Afghanistan and Iraq, Hurricane Katrina, the election of the first African American president, and an economic recession. As the global world changes and America adjusts to deal with these issues, institutions of higher education have a responsibility to broaden the scope and breadth of discussions beyond their own community. Our society is interdependent with most of the world due to economic systems, trade agreements, and information exchange making the world a smaller place, meaning worldly events have a direct influence on the American communities. It is important to provide the knowledge for students to be able to understand how these events directly affect their community and their lives.

The Associate in Arts in Political Science at Rose State College is designed to provide students with a good preparation for entry into a four-year college or university. The Political Science program at Rose State College provides students knowledge of the role of American government institutions, the mediums for citizen access and participation in the American political process; international relations; domestic public policy issues; and the theories behind the political ideals of America. The program also fulfills a major support role for the college's general education function, providing students with the basic knowledge to engage in the political process and become responsible citizens of their community.

# Previous Reviews and Actions from those reviews:

Our last full program review was during the 2011-2012 academic year. The program also completed a low-productivity report in the Spring 2017 semester. Based on this program review and report, the department realized that it needed to increase our students' civic engagement, as well as increase graduation and retention of Political Science majors. In response to these goals, the Political Science program created CIVOX, a Political Science student organization, in April 2017. The Political Science program also introduced the Great Debates Lecture series in September 2014 to expose students to statewide experts discussing as a panel current political issues of importance. The Political Science program further continues to promote our voter registration drive and student involvement in the Oklahoma Intercollegiate Legislators and Student Senate. The program has also redesigned its website and created an updated panel information card to use for recruitment purposes.

## A. Centrality of the Program to the Institution's Mission:

Rose State College is a public, open admissions, associate degree granting institution. Rose State College provides higher education preparation for lifelong learning through programs and services designed to serve a diverse community and prepare students for completion of a Bachelor's degree. The Political Science program is consistent with this mission by offering courses via the internet, TV, classroom, concurrent enrollment, and during the day and evening for two-, eight-, or 16-week sessions. The Political Science degree option prepares a diverse student population for transfer to a four-year institution.

# B. Vitality of the Program:

**B.1**.Program Objectives and Goals:

The Political Science program consists of a General Study option.

#### Political Science Degree Option

The goal of the Political Science Associate in Arts degree program is to provide students with a transfer program which focuses on the political system at the local, state, national, and international levels with course work in comparative political systems, international relations, contemporary issues, and state and local governments. Specific objectives include providing students with:

- The ability to understand and analyze different political systems and issues;
- The ability to understand and analyze different governance systems as they relate to political theory;
- A general education and historical foundation from which to learn to communicate, to think critically and to analyze problems.
- A perspective of different political systems as they compare to each other:
- A perspective of different geographical locations and how they impact the political and cultural systems of others;
- An historical perspective of a variety of regions and an analysis of its impact on international studies and relations;
- A foundation of support courses which provide sociological and historical perspectives to the analysis of international studies.

## **B.2** Quality Indicators (including Higher Learning Commission issues):

In the Rose State Political Science program, we take a holistic approach toward student success. Our program embraces numerous avenues to make the students' learning experience richer. We believe that these methods of civic, student, and academic engagement make our classrooms and students better. Our intention is to help students learn, distinguish ourselves from other educational organizations, address the differing needs of students, and illustrate that we value people. We encourage our students to get involved in a group, institution or cause that motivates them to learn more. We do this through our Political Science student organization (CIVOX); the Oklahoma Intercollegiate Legislature (OIL); the Great Debates Series; mentoring; and student service learning and internship projects. As part of our effort to

keep our curriculum rigorous and up-to-date, the faculty attend regional and national conferences. The department also has a yearly voter registration effort, has a speaker on campus for Constitution Day presenting on a Constitutional issue, and takes a group of students to the Oklahoma State Capital for a visit during session in the spring when state representatives' schedules make it feasible. These activities are a large part of creating a quality academic environment for Political Science students. In addition, the faculty continues its commitment to its profession by actively engaging in the intellectual inquiry in the field though conference participation, reviewing books, serving as a peer editor for peer-reviewed journals, and publication of individual papers and book chapters. As faculty, we see these efforts as essential to the development of our students by providing current literature and a more robust and knowledgeable faculty to answer questions, mentor, and provide leadership. It also provides faculty with the ability to create networks of colleagues, allowing us to seek future opportunities to guide our department and have an impact on our communities.
