Achieving Compliance with the Jeanne Clery Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Disclosure Act

History of the Clery Act

- In 1986, Jeanne Clery was raped and brutally murdered in her residence hall room at Lehigh University by another student. Her parents believe she would have taken precautions had she been aware of other recent, violent crimes on the Lehigh Campus.
- The Clery Act, enacted in 1990 and amended in 1998, 2000 and 2008, requires institutions of higher education to report crime statistics to current and prospective students and employees, and to the Department of Education

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Clery Act Responsibilities

- To ensure that students and employees are aware of potential dangers on their campuses, the Clery Act requires institutions of higher education to gather and publish data from three categories of campus authorities
 - Individuals or offices responsible for campus security
 - Individuals or office to which campus policy directs that crimes are reported.
 - Officials with significant responsibility for student and campus activities.

Campus Security Authorities

Campus Security

- Campus Police
 - While Rose State College no longer fields a dedicated police force, Midwest City Police officers provide law enforcement authority on campus.
- Non-police security staff who are
 - Responsible for monitoring or controlling entrance to campus property
 - Special event security staff





- CSAs are individuals on campus that students might seek out to report a crime, such as:
 - Student Housing staff
 - Student activity advisors
 - Academic advisors
 - Does not generally include faculty and staff





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- For Rose State College, those individuals include:
 - Vice President for Student Affairs and Marketing
 - Director, Student Conduct and Campus Compliance
 - Director of Student Engagement
 - Title IX Coordinator / Senior Director, Human Resources / AAO
 - Athletic Program Coaches
 - Senior Director, Campus Operations
 - Contract Security Staff



- Individuals that are excluded from the definition of campus security authority include:
 - Individual faculty who are not advisors to student groups
 - Individual campus health center physicians
 - Clerical staff



- Individuals do not have to report if:
 - You are a licensed mental health counselor or a pastoral counselor (recognized by a religious organization to provide confidential counseling), and
 - You working within the scope of your license or religious assignment.





- Even though as a counselor you are not required to report a crime, you may tell the individual how they can report the crime anonymously to campus officials or Midwest City Police.
- RSC encourages anonymous reports of criminal activity by counselors and victims.



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Campus Security Authorities Reporting

- As a Campus Security Authority, what are my responsibilities?
 - If someone tells you about a crime or incident that could be categorized as a crime, you must record the information and report it to the campus security officials (Midwest City Police officer, contract security official or Security Coordinator in the RSC Student Center)
 - How do I report the information?
 - Simply note the information as related to you by the individual and forward it to one of the responsible parties listed above using the RSC Incident Report Form
 - RSC Security officials / Midwest City Police will perform the analysis.
 - When in doubt, report.

This form must be completed within 44 hours of a reported accident/incident.

The individual at the scene should complete this form & immediately provide the original to Human Resources, ADM Rm. 104.

Human Resources will distribute the copies and information to the appropriate individuals/departments.

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Campus Security Authorities Reporting

- Inform the individual that you must report the incident, but will not identify anyone involved unless the individual / victim consents to revealing their identity.
- Include contact information for your department.
- Inform the individual about options for reporting to the Security officials / Midwest City Police.
- Inform them that they can report anonymously.
- Remember: the decision to identify a witness or victim is not yours to make.
 - An individual that talks to you does not have to talk to the police.

Campus Security Authorities Reportable Crimes under the Clery Act

 The following is a comprehensive list of crimes that are required to be reported under the Clery Act.
This list is informational only: if you are unsure which crime was committed, simply list the criminal act as accurately as possible. Security authorities will review the information and, pending any investigation, will make a final determination into which category that action should be listed.



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- Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter: The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.
- Negligent Manslaughter: The killing of another person through gross negligence.
- Forcible Sex Offenses: Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.
- Forcible Rape: The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against the person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity or because of his/her youth.

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- Forcible Sodomy: Oral or anal sexual intercourse
 with another person, forcibly and/or against that
 person's will; or not forcibly against the person's
 will where the victim is incapable of giving consent
 because of his/her youth or because of his/her
 temporary or permanent mental or physical
 incapacity.
- Sexual Assault with an Object: The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

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- Forcible Fondling: The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or, not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.
- Non-Forcible Sex Offenses: Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse (incest or statutory rape): Nonforcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

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- Statutory Rape: Non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.
- Robbery: The taking or attempted taking of anything of value under confrontational circumstances from another person by force threat of force or violence.
- Aggravated Assault: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could or probably would result in a serious potential injury if the crime were successfully completed.



- Domestic Violence: Violent Misdemeanor and felony offenses committed by the victim's current or former spouse, current or former cohabitant or person protected under the domestic or family violence laws.
- Dating Violence: Violence by a person who has been in a romantic or intimate relationship with the victim.
- Stalking: A course of conduct directed at a specific person, that would cause a reasonable person to fear for her, his, or others' safety, or to suffer substantial emotional distress.
- Liquor Law Violations: The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintain unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

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- Burglary: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or a felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.
- Motor Vehicle Theft: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned-including joy riding).
- Arson: Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property, etc.

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- Drug Abuse Violations: Violations of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadone); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzedrine).
- Illegal Weapons Law Possession: The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

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Campus Security Authorities Reportable Crimes under the Clery Act

HATE CRIME DEFINTIONS

- Larceny/theft: The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.
- Simple assault: An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury.
- Intimidation: To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to an actual physical attack.

Campus Security Authorities Reportable Crimes under the Clery Act

HATE CRIME DEFINTIONS

 Destruction/damage/vandalism of property (except "arson"): To willfully or maliciously destroy, damage, deface, or otherwise injure real or personal property without the consent of the owner or the person having custody or control of it.



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Campus Security Authorities Report Information

The following information should be included in any report (unless unavailable):

- Type of Crime (if unsure, contact the security office)
- Note if the crime was committed:
 - On campus
 - On public property adjacent to campus
 - On non-campus property owned or controlled by the College
- Date / Time
 - Date / time the incident occurred
 - Date / time it was reported to you

Campus Security Authorities Report Information

The following information should be included in any report (unless unavailable):

- Name of the victim (if the victim wishes to be identified)
- Identity of any known suspects or witnesses
- Use and type of any weapon used in the commission of the crime





Campus Security Authorities What Not to Report

Do not report crimes if:

- The crime occurred before the person came to the College
- The crime occurred while the person was away from campus and not involved in a student activity (they should still be encouraged to report the crime to local law enforcement authorities).





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Campus Security Authorities Report Information

- Note the information the individual is willing to provide. If you are unsure if a crime has occurred, or about in which category the crime should be classified, allow the security authorities to make that determination.
 - You do not have to prove that the crime occurred.
 - DO NOT attempt to find the perpetrator. Include information about the perpetrator, i.e., height, weight, build, race, distinguishing marks, and name if it is known.
 - Do not identify the victim unless the victim consents to being identified.

Campus Security Authorities Report Information

- Description of the incident or crime
 - Detailed information will assist security authorities in their investigation.
 - Secure as accurate and complete information as possible.
 - If you are unsure if a crime has been reported, proceed with reporting the incident and allow security authorities to make the determination.





Campus Security Authorities Report Information

 If the individual reporting the crime is in imminent danger or harm, contact the Midwest City Police Department immediately. Dial 9-911 if from a campus phone or 911 from a cell phone or off campus.
